

Senate Votes **Divorce Bill** In Italy

ROME (AP) - The Senate adopted an historic divorce bill last night, leaving only minor amendments to be acted on by the Chamber of Deputies before divorce becomes legal in Roman Catholic Italy.

The chamber had already approved the basic bill. The crucial Senate vote was

164 in favor of the legislation and 150 against, with no abstentions. Required majority was 158.

It carried Italy past a milestone in its 100-year existence as a unified nation by putting both Houses of Parliament on record for the first time as Lawrence Acad. having voted for the introduction of divorce.

overrode the objection of the country's largest party, the Caristian Democrats, and defied the opposition of the Roman Catholic church.

Divorce advocates estimated that upward of 500,000 persons legally separated from their spouses now live in Italy. Three times this number are believed to be separated without having taken legal steps.

The flood of divorce requests from those whose cases fit the limited requirements of the proposed law could bring the marriage court system to paralysis, lawyers said.

N.Y. Exhibit First of His Works in 53 Years

Eakins, Artist Out of His Time

By MALCOLM PRESTON

NEW YORK - Thomas Eakins may well be the classic American example of an artist out of place in time. At his death in 1916 (aged 72) only three museums owned his work. Rejected by the public and critics alike, his precise statements of fact, his objective, rather scientific approach to painting ran contrary to the prevailing tide of popular romanticism in the last quarter of the 19th Century. And in the last years of his life, the new imports from Europe, Fauvism, Cubism and the growing departure from external reality, overshadowed his naturalism.

NOW, AND THROUGH Nov. 22, the Whitney Museum opens its fall season with the first comprehensive exhibition of his work in New York in 53 years. Over 150 of his oils. watercolors, drawings, sculp-tures and photographs assay his greatness.

After a period of study abroad, Eakins returned to his native Philadelphia, bringing with him a love of Valazquez and Ribera. The concern of these Spaniards with light and anatomy, and their beautiful use of sombre dark color became a part of Eakins realism. His keenly inquiring mind sought out the basic principles of anatomy and perspective.

As a teacher at the Pennsylvania Academy, he introduced the nude model to prudish Philadelphia, replacing the dull, lifeless plaster casts. He devoted himself to photographic studies of the figure in action. Working with

IN HIS LATER YEARS, moody and brooding over his rejection by the art world, Eakins turned out a long series of portraits. Like Copley before him, these are compassionate, incisive studies. The unrelentless truth of his earlier work gives way to a softer, gentler treatment. "Franklin L. Schenck" is a beautifully painted work, as is "Girl in a Big Hat." They reflect the admiration Eakins had for Rembrandt, in their use of light and strength of form, but somehow they are more detached.

The roots of realism lie deep in American art. And, Thomas Eakins is, above all, a painter of reality; palpable, measurable, discernable reality. His chess players, boxers, oarsmen, doctors, professors and concert singers are not merely objects in the tapestry of his canvases, they are men and women who lived and died and now live again in
