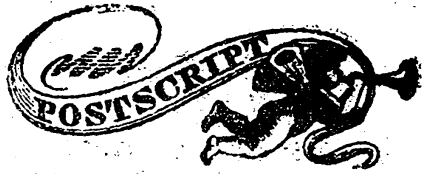

### LATEST FROM EUROPE.

**RUSSIA.**—An extraordinary supplement to the St. Petersburg Gazette of the 24th May, contains a report from the theatre of war, dated May 16th.—Bucharest, the report says, was occupied on the 12th, by the vanguard of the 6th cavalry corps. The rapidity of the Russian advance saved the capital of Moldavia from the ruin that threatened it. The fortress of Brailow was invested on the 11th; on the 17th the heavy cannon arrived; and on the 17th the Grand Duke Michael, to whom the siege was especially entrusted, arrived. It is not thought that it can hold out long, as the place is weak. No action of any importance had taken place up to the date of the report, which is made by Gen. Wittgenstein.

**TURKEY.**—The passage of the Pruth by the Russians had been known in the capital on the 13th. The Divan had immediately an extraordinary meeting, which was renewed daily till the 18th, when war was pronounced by Proclamations in all the market-places and mosques. Orders were issued for a general arming; the troops still in the capital were sent in the direction of the seat of war, and a communication was made to the European Ministers, requesting them to inform their respective Courts, that the Porte was going to try the fortress of war in defence of its incontestable rights, and that it would rather perish than submit to have law dictated to it, as long as it had arms in its hands." By another proclamation the Faithful have been ordered not to give or receive quarter in the approaching contest.

We are requested to state, that a republican county convention will be holden at Ballston Spa during the next term of the common pleas, for the choice of delegates to attend the senatorial and state conventions, and that a notice of the central committee will probably be published next week. We suggest the propriety of an early choice of delegates in the respective towns, to attend the county convention.

A letter to the editor from Moreau, says, that Mr. James Mott, of that town, lost a horse, mare and colt on the 31st ult. supposed to have been struck with lightning—valued at \$250.
