

**NED BUNTLINE AND THE NEW YORK RIOTS.**—We received an Extra from the office of "Ned Buntline's Own," in which the editor explains the cause of his being arrested as one of the rioters in the late unhappy affair in New York. The efforts of certain cliques to put Ned down will prove unavailing—he is engaged in a cause that requires the utmost energy and perseverance, and Mr. Judson is the man to carry it on with success. He gives a certain lawyer, formerly of this town, some pretty hard rubs, and we have no doubt he deserves them. In regard to the riot he says he "deems it necessary to say that he was not participating in the riot at the Astor Place Opera House on the night of the 10th; that he merely walked over there from the bed-side of a sick wife, to see if the reports were true which had reached him in regard to there being a mob—and without knowing a single man in the crowd, while standing in silence on the side-walk, he was arrested. The reason of that arrest can perhaps be accounted for by those who have read his articles in regard to the police lately. They were determined to show their *efficiency* upon an unarmed, unoffending quiet person, who, at the moment of his arrest, not having been *five minutes* on the ground, was turning to go home to the presence of his sick wife. The article in my paper which was *already published* when this affair occurred, it having gone to press at *three o'clock* on Thursday afternoon, referring to the riot of the 8th, and the Macready quarrel, will at once explain my sentiments in regard to riots, and prove that I am not one to countenance them by word or deed."
