

ween Superior and Huron. He says, Michimacanat, at the extremity of Lake Huron, about 1 mile in circuit, and is seen 12 leagues. There are two islands, south of it, one of 5 leagues in length, and the other small.

The last accounts from Detroit assure us that 100 troops are at that station in good health. The Country around is fast recovering from the mischievous effects of war. The season had been as favourable to them as to us. That in the present season they had received 17 hundred head of Cattle at Detroit from Ohio, and 200 had reached Greenbay, in Michigan, from the same State, having pursued 500 miles. We may expect a more particular account of this country, which is sought before the public eye by the visit of our President, as this is given as the Northwest terminating point of his present visit to

the Northern States, and this being the most northern in the Union. Detroit is nearly west of us, upon a difference of about 12 degrees of longitude. Within the present extent of it has been destroyed by fire. It suffered much in the war. It is now rising, but has not been so distinguished by its military importance as it once was. It is the seat of government of this new settlement, and its neighbour, and has not indeed but lately felt a wild west, we cannot refuse good hopes for such a position as this. The author, we mentioned, upon his first visit to this country, tells us that from Long Point in Erie, to the Detroit river, is a west course. From the entrance to the Lake of St. Clair, it is 5 leagues. West of this position is Lake Michigan, and by Detroit is the communication by water through Lake Huron. The new settlers in Ohio have not been

are disposed to pay early attention to their commerce. The easy communication of their northern and southern rivers has been prominently noticed, and offers command at every point. One of their citizens observing the benefit of the Steam engine, has proposed a boat with paddles to be moved by a machine easily managed under the deck by hands, without the expense of steam, or of animal strength. It has been employed also in introducing the lever into a machine for thrashing and breaking, in agricultural employments. Much we believe may be promised. At Cincinnati, which appears to have a full share of the enterprise and industry of the west, we learn

that Bell, iron, and brass roundels have been introduced, and steam engines have been manufactured. The furnaces were in operation within two months after the works were begun. We are assured other machines will soon be erected. They early adopted the plan of an Academy and College, but we have not had a distinct history of the progress. They have a Theatre in which they have the beginning of their theatrical amusements, of which they speak with great fondness and pride. Proper care will undoubtedly be taken to preserve the names of the enterprising founders and benefactors of the country.

It is not our lot to speak only of our private sufferings. While we were welcoming all the offerings of an extraordinary season, some extraordinary sufferings have fixed the record of it upon our memory. While we turn to Baltimore for the greatest losses of property, it is a very powerful relief, that charity was never more active, that enterprise was never less discouraged by suffering, and that with the first reports we hear of mills actually repaired, and dams restored, without one delay or check of action occurred.
