Overview

As the first draft of history, American newspapers have preserved essential records and detailed accounts of the people, issues and events that shaped the nation for hundreds of years. In the 1800s, American newspapers were often published by small-town printers and reflected the interests and values of the communities they served. But as the country grew and changed, so too did its newspapers. In the 19th century, the number of titles published rose dramatically, and newspapers were transformed by an increasing emphasis on society, industry, scientific advances, investigative journalism and human-interest stories. By the early 20th century, nearly every town in the United States had its own newspaper.

Thousands of titles from all 50 states

For searching and browsing American newspapers published in three centuries, *America's Historical Newspapers* is the most comprehensive online resource available. Continually expanding, it offers searchable digital facsimiles of thousands of titles from all 50 states. With eyewitness reporting, editorials, letters, advertisements, obituaries and much more, this acclaimed collection uniquely chronicles the evolution of American culture and daily life from 1690 to the recent past.

Multiple series, many options, but a single interface

The core of *America's Historical Newspapers* is *Early American Newspapers, 1690-1922*—the most extensive resource of its kind for exploring the essential record of the American past. Easily tailored to meet the needs of every institution's students and faculty, *Early American Newspapers, 1690-1922*, can be acquired by one or more series, by place of publication, by era and by decade.

The essential complement to *Early American Newspapers* is *American Ethnic Newspapers*, which includes *African American Newspapers, 1827-1998*; *Hispanic American Newspapers, 1808-1980*; and *Ethnic American Newspapers from the Balch Collection, 1799-1971*. Also available are *Caribbean Newspapers, 1718-1876*, and five subject-specific newspaper collections: *American Business: Agricultural Newspapers*; *American Business: Mercantile Newspapers*; *American Gazettes: Newspapers of Record*; *American Politics: Campaign Newspapers*; and *American Religion: Denominational Newspapers*. Finally, *America's Historical Newspapers* includes the *Washington Evening Star (1852-1981)*—the newspaper of record for the nation's capital.

America's Historical Newspapers has been created through partnerships with the American Antiquarian Society, the Library of Congress, the Wisconsin Historical Society and more than 90 other institutions. A distinguished academic advisory board guides the title selection process.
