

# Union Boss Rule Feared By Senator

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 30—Eight years from now union bosses may hold such monopoly power that no political party would be able to stand up to them, Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.), Republican gubernatorial nominee, said here today.

The senator, winding up his campaign, said he decided to forsake his position as Republican leader in the U.S. Senate to return to California and raise the issue now while there is still time.

At a rally of Young Republicans on the University of San Francisco campus, he was asked from the audience: "Why did you decide to run for governor?"

## 'BILL OF RIGHTS'

"The reason I determined to run for governor of this state is that I believe in the issue of the workers' bill of rights," Knowland replied.

"It is my personal opinion that four years from now will be too late to raise that issue and eight years from now will definitely be too late to raise it, because by that time you will have such a monopoly power with the power of assessment and the tremendous resources at their disposal, that no political party, Democrat, Republican, or independent, will be able to stand up against that type of monopoly power and this is not in my judgement in the best interests of our country or the workers themselves.

"That was the basic reason I came back to run for governor."

## REDUCE POWER

Knowland conceded that the right-to-work Proposition 18 would reduce the power of labor bosses, but would reduce their power over their members rather than their power to bargain with management.

The senator also charged his Democratic opponent, Atty. Gen. Brown, with allowing California to become the "pornography center" of the nation.

"Brown has acknowledged the growth of the smut racket, but hasn't done anything effective about it," Knowland said. "He always refuses to be held responsible for his own ineptitude."

Knowland promised that within 30 days of taking office he would move to help "the new attorney general, Pat Hillings," in stamping out smut.

## Third Regulus Is Fired Inland

POINT MUGU, Calif., Oct. 30 (UPI)—The Navy today successfully launched a Regulus II guided missile—the third such inland test from this base—and landed it 900 miles away in an isolated desert area.

The missile, capable of carrying nuclear warheads, was launched early today from the U.S. Naval Air Missile Test Center here and landed at Antelope Dry Lake, near Tonopah, Nev.

The Navy said the Regulus II fired today flew out to sea, then returned over uninhabited inland terrain.

It was accompanied by Navy jet planes.

Friends said he had been despondent since the death two years ago of his wife.

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## Mediators Act To Avert Strike

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (UP)—Federal mediators today moved into a contract dispute between the American Newspaper Guild and New York's seven major daily newspapers. They seek to avert a strike tomorrow at midnight.

The guild has said it will strike one or two newspapers if the deadline passes without settlement, but hasn't decided which ones. The contracts of all seven papers expire at the same time.

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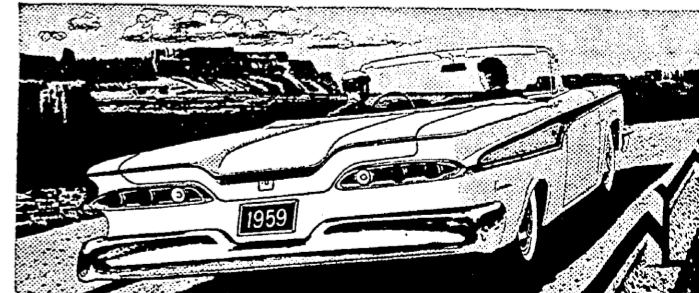
