

ATTEMPT TO KIDNAP, HENRY BOX, BROWN.—An attack was made on Henry Box Brown, the fugitive slave, in Providence, on Friday, by some men whose purposes were not fully disclosed. We are told that Mr. Brown was twice attacked, while walking peaceably through the streets, and at one time the attempt was made to force him into a carriage. He proved too strong for them. His friends think the object was to get him on board a vessel bound to Charleston, or to dispose of him Southward, in some other way.

The following is the Police record in the Providence Post, relative to the affair:—

Thomas Kelton was fined \$15 and costs for an assault on Henry Box Brown. Appealed.

It appeared, in evidence, that Henry was passing quietly up Broad street on Friday afternoon, when he was attacked by Kelton and others, and severely beaten without any known cause. It was admitted, however, that Kelton was intoxicated. If we are not mistaken, the fine and costs were paid, when an idea struck the counsel for the defendant; and an appeal was taken. It was probably understood that Mr. Brown's business would not admit of his remaining in the city until the next session of the Court of Common Pleas. Hazard for Plaintiff—Curry for Defendant.
