Show Opens At Oakland

ROSEBURG, Dec. 9 (AP)—The 13th annual Northwestern Turkey show opened at Oakland Tuesday with approximately 1100 turkeys entered by 152 exhibitors from Oregon, Washington and California, with one display from North Dakota. The birds were about equally divided between the live and dressed disciplines.

Identity Made By Certificate

The fact that some Chinese and Japanese are virtually indistinguishable to the occidental eye was taken into account Tuesday by Silwing P. C. Au, Chinese consul in Portland.

By federal regulation, Japanese nationals have been barred from traveling on public conveyances, such as trains, planes and buses.

Chinese Get Certificates

To prevent Japanese masquerading as Chinese, Consul Au started issuing certificates of registration to Chinese. Each certificate, with identifying information written in Chinese characters, bears the portrait of the bearer.

One of the first to obtain his certificate Tuesday was smiling Henry Wong, 17, of 517 S. W. 1st avenue, who was born in Canton, China.
