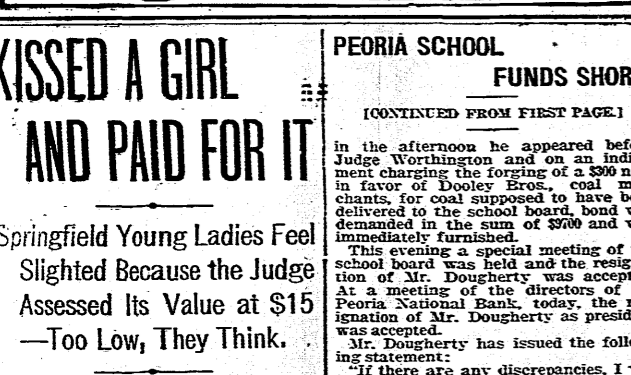

Sanford Damned All Who Disobeyed Him and "Didn't Care if Bartlett Boy Lay Dead Before Him," Jury Is Told.

(Special Dispatch to the Boston Herald.) AUBURN, Me., Oct. 5, 1905. The Rev. Frank W. Sanford sat through today's opening and closing arguments on the charge of manslaughter apparently oblivious to all that was going on. He paid little or no attention to the witnesses and occupied his time in writing, filling several large sheets of manuscript.

The state officials intend to make as emphatic as possible the claim that Sanford was supreme ruler at Shiloh, that a fast of three days ended on Jan. 25, 1906, the day the boy, Leander A.
