

OWNERS JUBILANT, BUT FEEL BROOKLYN SHOULD BUY ROBINSON

Chicago, (AP)—Other than the manner in which Jackie Robinson, UCLA athlete star and Kansas City Monarchs shortstop, was signed by Branch Rickey, owner of the Brooklyn Dodgers (minor league team, Negro club owners expressed jubilation last week when the white baseball finally lowered its clem bar to admit a Negro player.

While the signing of Robinson at Montreal last week was hailed throughout the nation as the first Negro player to enter the minor or major leagues, the baseball press that several Negroes have penetrated organized white baseball before George Stoney, a Negro pitcher whose 35 victories in one year is still a minor league record, played with the Newark international league in 1931, Charlie Grant, a former infielder, played with the late John McGraw peddled off on players and fans as a Negro, played with the Newark international league and Sol White played second base for the Wheeling national league last year.

News of Robinson's berth on the Montreal team brooked expressions of jubilation from Negro club owners as well as from Negroes. J. E. Hinton, president of the Negro American league, who has often expressed a hope that Negro players would be admitted someday to big league teams wrote a letter of congratulations to Branch Rickey.

"After learning of the signing of Jackie Robinson into the Montreal baseball club through your efforts," he told the Brooklyn Dodger owner, "I feel that you are more than justified in your moral course in making the initial step which will give Negro players a chance to participate in the major leagues in this, our great democracy.

"I feel that I speak the sentiments of 15 million Negroes in America who are with you one hundred per cent and will always remember the day and date of this great event. I wish you, Robinson, the Montreal baseball club and all concerned the greatest success."

Went Pay For Robinson

The only dissatisfaction expressed by the white owners of the Kansas City Monarchs, the team of J. L. Wilkinson, was the contention that "we should have been paid something by the Brooklyn club." Robinson, the 26-year-old player who starred on the University of California at Los Angeles football and basketball teams, joined the Monarchs in 1932 and was being honorably discharged from the United States Army as a second lieutenant.

SINATRA RAPS INTOLERANCE

New York, Frank Sinatra, 27, multi-faceted, composed racial religious intolerance in a speech here to several thousand students at Benjamin Franklin high school October 23.

The high school was the scene several weeks ago of disturbances between Negro and white teenage groups, some students in the school and some boys in the neighborhood. Sinatra told the audience not to let a few bad apples spoil the barrel and called names or indicating any racial preference. "I don't want to see any of these 'neighborhood enclaves of racial good-will.' At both extremes you've got 'Aren't you Glad You're You?'"

Sinatra's appearance was arranged by national office of the NAACP with Dr. Leon C. Coville, President of the school.
