

MRS. JOHN WARREN'S LIFE AND FAMILY.

The death of Mrs. John Warren in her ninetieth year removes another of the rapidly vanishing links between the present and the earlier days of the country. Her father, Phillp Church, of Belvidere, Allegany County, N. Y., was the nephew of Alexander Hamilton, and on his staff at the time of the duel. John Barker Church, Mrs. Warren's grandfather, came here prior to the Revolutionary War in company with the first Delasfeld who settled in America and who, after serving on Lafayette's staff during the war, formed the well-known firm of Church & Delasfeld, underwriters for all the shipping of New-York. This firm's heavy losses formed subsequently a large portion of the French spoliation claims, never yet settled by the Government. John B. Church returned to England and became a member of Parliament, representing Wendover. His son Phillp came back to America and married the beautiful Ann Stuart, of Philadelphia, daughter of General Walter Stuart, of Revolutionary fame. General Washington gave the bride away, and made a present to her of a miniature of himself, set in diamonds. Phillp Church obtained a tract of land in Allegany County and built the first stone house in that region. The now flourishing town of Angelica was started by the settlers who went with him into the wilderness, and who named the settlement Angelica, after his mother, Angelica Schuyler. Mrs. Warren was born at this place, and lived there until her marriage with John Warren, a well-known and highly respected man, of this city. Their hospitable home in Bond-st. is well remembered by old New-York families. When General Lafayette was in this country on his last visit, at the reception given for him, he immediately recognized Mrs. Warren by her likeness to her grandfather, his old friend John B. Church, and he crossed the room to speak with her, disclaiming the formality of an introduction. Her faculties remained unimpaired to the end, and her memory was stored with interesting anecdotes. She was a devoted member of Calvary Church, and her acts of benevolence were as constant as they were unobtrusive. She leaves no children. A sister, Mrs. Robert Harwood, survives her in England, and also a brother, Richard Church, of this city. The funeral will be held to-day at Calvary Church, at 3:30 o'clock.
